


In the spring of 2017, the National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities (NASUAD) surveyed the directors of state aging and disability agencies regarding the significant policy, fiscal, and operational issues within each state. This survey is utilized to compile NASUAD's biannual report, the *State of the States in Aging and Disability*. As a component of the survey, state respondents were asked the following question:

What system do you currently use for OAA [Older Americans Act] data collection, aggregation, analysis, and reporting?

States were given a choice of four predetermined choices to select from: Mediware, PeerPlace, State Created, and Other. Forty-nine states and the District of Columbia (DC) responded to the question. Twenty-seven states and DC reported using Mediware (Harmony) for their OAA data collection system; seven states reported using their own internally created system; five states reported using RTZ/GetCare; four states selected Other; three states selected PeerPlace; and three states reported AIM. NASUAD anticipates that the number of states transitioning to


different systems, or altering their current ones, may increase between this year's survey—2017—and the next iteration of the survey in 2019. This is due to changes being considered by the Administration for Community Living (ACL) as a part of its process of modernizing and redesigning the State Program Report (SPR) that states must submit as a part of administering OAA programs.²

States were also surveyed regarding past, current, and potential changes of vendors regarding their OAA data systems. Four states indicated that they had changed their IT vendor for their OAA data system since 2014; six states and DC reported that they were actively in the process of implementing a new system; six states said they were considering procuring a new system; and 33 states responded that they have not or are not considering implementing a new data system.
