

Asking LGBT Inclusive Intake Questions









Why is it important to ask intake questions inclusive of sexual orientation and gender identity?



Inclusive data Provides important information about WHO a person is.



Data informs important decisions in planning and delivery of services.

Demographic data helps tell the story of who we serve and where additional outreach and support may be needed.

For older LGBT people research shows a higher risk of health disparities and social isolation — yet LGBT folks have often remained invisible to the aging network.

Asking LGBT inclusive intake questions helps the aging network to know WHO they are serving.




Rolling Out SOGI

California Department of Aging (CDA)'s Legislative Mandate

Assembly Bill 959 (AB 959), The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Disparities Reduction Act of 2015 (Chiu, Chapter 565, Statutes of 2015), requires CDA to begin collecting voluntary self-identified information about Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) no later than July 1, 2018. As a result, Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) are required to update their Management Information System (MIS) in order to collect the required SOGI data and submit it to CDA as part of our regular data submission process.

SUBJECT: SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND GENDER IDENTITY (SOGI) / LESBIAN, GAY,

<u>PURPOSE</u>

The purpose of this Program Memo is to provide notification regarding the California Department of Aging (CDA) and Services & Advocacy for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Elders (SAGE) National Resource Center on the mandatory LGBT Aging Webinar Series, as related to Assembly Bill 959.

BACKGROUND

Assembly Bill 368 (M.S 950), The Leablan, Cay, Blasoual, and Transparder Disparities Reduction.
Act of 2016 (Chu, Chapter 655, Statutes of 2016), requires CDA to begin coalecting voluntary self-identified information about Sexual Orientation and Gender Identify (SOGI) no later than July 1, 2018. As a result, Area Appendies on Appin (AAAs) are required to Update their Management Information System (MIS) in order to collect the required SOGI data and submit it to CDA as part of our regular data submission process.

SAGECare is providing training on LGBT aging issues to all AAA Service Providers. As a division of SAGE, SAGECare is part of the country's largest and oldest organization dedicated to improving the lives of LGBT older adults.

POLICY/ PROCEDURES

The County of Los Angeles Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services (WDACS) Area Agency on Aging (AAA) is engaged in a state-wide initiative to increase services and support to LGBT older adults. CDA is collaborating with SAGE's National Resource Center on LGBT aging and SAGECare Training and Credentialing Department to provide two (2) mandatory free webhara to California AAAs and Service Providers. WEBINAR #1 - SUPPORTING LGBT OLDER ADULTS

This webinar provides an introduction to the specific needs and experiences of LGBT older adults. Participants will beam the definition of terms such as Leabian, Gay, Bissaul, Transgender, and others. After this introduction to useful terminology, participants will contextualize the lives of LGBT older adults through case studies and videos of real individuals, in order to understancy some LGBT older adults may choose not to come out. WEBINAR #2 - ASKING INCLUSIVE INTAKE QUESTIONS

This training provides participants with the framing and looks to adjust current intake processes to reflect diversity in sexual orientation and gender identity. Participants are given a grounding in appropriate language around sexual orientation and gender identity for older adults. After this, they explore the current mindest and crimate around intake procedures and how bose intake processes do not account for non-heterosexual individuals. Finally, participants are introduced to multiple ways in which to ask inclusive intake questions that take the various experiences around sexual orientation and gender identity into account. Trainings for Service Providers

Group viewings of SAGECare webinar with APS Information & Assistance staff and social workers with **facilitated discussion** lead by AAA/APS staff at LA County WDACS office

SAGECare webinars with AAA service providers at their respective offices

Lessons Learned

Group webinar viewing with face to face facilitated discussion created organic opportunity for APS I&A staff to share their experiences with LGBTQ clients, ask questions they wouldn't otherwise ask at a webinar, and share their personal connection with the LGBTQ community

Post-training feedback from APS social workers was eye-opening:

- Desired <u>more</u> training on LGBTQ issues because they didn't feel prepared enough to ask SOGI questions and were somewhat afraid to ask
- ☐ Needed help to <u>develop strategies</u> to deal with negative responses or non-response from clients/constituents

On-going technical assistance for service providers is vital to improve SOGI data reporting. It can help them tackle the challenges and build confidence in LGBTQ cultural competency.

The more LGBTQ culturally competent service providers are, the easier to ask SOGI questions and creates a safer environment for LGBTQ clients to disclose their identities.

More Lessons Learned


Review the data on a regular basis to catch possible errors and clarify the identity categories so that client responses are captured accurately

As data systems change, make sure SOGI data is being *captured consistently*

■ New LA County WDACS/AAA internal database didn't include SOGI data even though SOGI questions are included in the Universal Intake Form (UIF)

Sonoma County Location and Demographics



- -Located 1 hour north of SF
